Vaping and JUULing! A Health Risk for our Students!

What is it:

Electronic devices known as "ENDS" (electronic nicotine delivery systems), "e-cigs", vaporizers, vapes, or hookah pens are generally battery-operated and use a heating element to convert a liquid called e-liquid or e-juice into a toxic, nicotine aerosol or vapor, which the user inhales.

Are they safe:

The e-juices and e-liquids contain many chemicals and toxins that are ingested by the user. Recent studies have shown that even e-juices labeled as Nicotine Free contain small amounts of nicotine. In fact, 99% of e-juices sold in the United States contain nicotine. Also, "Teenagers are becoming regular users, and the proportion of regular users is increasing," says Gottlieb, a physician. "We're going to have to take action. "No one can look at the data and say there's no problem," he says.

1/3 of all kids that use these devices use it with a chemical other than nicotine. The most common chemical used is marijuana oil. They also contain chemicals such as antifreeze, formaldehyde, diacetyl, and artificial flavoring known to cause cancer and lung irritation.

Health risks:

Nicotine is highly addictive and negatively impacts adolescent brain development. Recent studies have shown that many e-juice units or pods contain more nicotine than a pack of cigarettes. Additionally, the nicotine used in these devices differs from the nicotine in a cigarette. These e-juices contain a nicotine salt produced using benzoic acid that makes the nicotine less harsh and therefore easier to smoke and ingest. The easier it is to smoke the more the user ingests. Furthermore, diacetyl can cause irreversible lung disease, and of course, antifreeze and formaldehyde are not safe for ingestion.

Common misconceptions:

It is just water vapor!

No, in fact, it is an aerosol similar to what makes spray paint, hair spray, and deodorant. If it was just water, you would not get a vapor.

It is safer than cigarettes!

No, in fact, due to recent studies, the FDA has begun cracking down on manufacturers of these products due to misleading and out right deceitful advertising. The FDA is currently in the process of placing further restrictions on these devices and will more than likely label them similar to cigarettes.

It is legal!

Not for anyone under the age of 18. In fact, USD 303 administration will treat it just like it was a cigarette if found on any USD 303 property.

What can I do:

If you saw a teenager smoking a cigarette, you would say something. These devices are no different. Talk to your kids, they will listen. You are the number one reason children choose not to participate in activities such as these. Please talk to your kids, share the dangers of vaping and JUULing just like you share the hands of children dangers of smoking, and don't provide these dangerous chemicals to your child. And don't forget, it is illegal for anyone under the age of 18 to possess or use these devices, and they will be treated no different than a cigarette on school property.

Food and Drug Administration Commissioner **Scott Gottlieb on Wednesday** declared youth vaping an "epidemic," and said the agency will halt sales of flavored electronic cigarettes if the major manufacturers can't prove they are doing enough to keep them out of the and teens.

Educators can request things such as books, manipulatives, projects, electronics, experiences, etc. for their classrooms that would otherwise be purchased using their own personal funds or by the school. It then puts the power in the hands of the donors, who are able to choose the individual projects they would like to put their money towards. These materials, once fully funded by generous donors, are then purchased, shipped and belong to the school. Students write the donors thank you's and are then able to enjoy the items to the fullest. It's that simple!

Teachers use Donors Choose for different reasons but there are two reasons most common. We know budgets are limited and so are our own. We also all want what is best for our students and to give them every opportunity we can. With the limitations in our own budgets, we tend to find other ways to "make it happen." In the short year that I have been using Donors Choose personally, I have been able to get sets of books that the students are EXCITED to read (ask most any 6th grader about a series called *Amulet* and you'll get an ear full), an Osmo kit for my math students to practice money skills, math facts, and letters in a fun and engaging way, two circuit robots/rovers for our MakerSpace kids to enjoy, a large number rug to utilize in my classroom, upon a handful of other small items that can make a big difference.

If you give a teacher a resource, they will use it to its fullest potential. We have truly found a gem of a resource available to us and our students. 


Teaching Skills Through Word Ladders

The Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth graders that receive "extra intervention time" through Mrs. Foos have been using Word Ladders to help them build the decoding, phonics, spelling, and vocabulary skills that they may be missing. When students add or rearrange letters to make a new word from one they have already made, they must examine sound-symbol relationships closely. This is just the kind of analysis that all children need to be able to perform in order to learn to decode and spell accurately.

When the puzzle adds a bit of meaning in the form of a definition (for example, "To drop or descend" FALL) it helps to extend students' understanding of words and concepts. All of these skills are key to students' success in learning to read and write. So even though completing Word Ladders may seem like a fun game, the students are practicing essential literacy skills at the same time. These mini lessons take no longer than ten minutes to complete, but the students are gaining decoding, phonics, spelling and vocabulary skills that they have missed learning somewhere along the way in their previous elementary education learning experiences.

Eli the Eagle Kicks Off LiNK Grant Activities During Halftime of Homecoming

On September 14th, the Ness City High School FCS class hosted a "Read with Eli." Reading with Eli was a chance for all children to listen to Eli the Eagle read during halftime of the homecoming game. Reading aloud is one of the most important things we can do for our little eagles. It builds foundational skills, lays the groundwork for loving books, and



introduces vocabulary and new ideas.

As the little eagles were leaving the field, they also received a free book to take home.

This program was made possible through a Literacy Network of Kansas (LiNK) project grant that USD 303 was awarded during the June 12th, State Board of Education Meeting in Topeka. USD 303 worked with nine other area School Districts to secure a 3 year \$3.2 million grant designed to improve literacy in children Birth through 12th grade helping them become successful readers and writers. During the 3 year grant cycle, USD 303 will receive \$79,881 a year for a total of \$239,043. These funds will be used to provide training and support for all USD 303 teachers, purchase materials and aides designed to improve reading, oral, and written literacy, and develop community engagement centered around literacy. The District will be working with local daycare providers, pre-schools, health department, extension service, library, Rotary, and other community.

"This is an exciting opportunity that several staff members worked hard to obtain. This grant will help not only our school, but our entire community grow and improve. We are excited to work with several community partners to provide the best literacy based education possible." Derek Reinhardt, Superintendent USD 303 A big thank you goes out to the Ness City Rotary Club for helping with the activity and supporting literacy. We look forward to working with all students, staff, and community members to improve the literacy

Finally, first, third and sixth grades will be participating in a virtual hog farm field trip at the end of the month.

Tiny House Project Helps Grow Programs Across the Country

Without risk, there is rarely reward! Trying new things and sticking your foot out of the proverbial comfort zone can be risky. Often times, it can result in physical, emotional, and financial pain. But, at the same time, if we never tried new things or stepped out of our comfort zone nothing would ever change, improvements would never occur, and we would never reap the rewards we have the potential to reap. For the last four years, students and staff have been encouraged to step out of their comfort zone, and try new things. While we have encountered failure at times, we have learned from those failures, and used those opportunities to reassess, and develop a better plan of attack to achieve our goals. As we move ourselves to a growth mindset, we have been able to achieve many great things as

individuals, classrooms, clubs, schools, and ultimately a community.

This mindset is very apparent in the Tiny House Project Brent Kerr's construction classes have been working on the last two years. What started as a "you want to do what" idea, has turned into a program that has been recognized across the State and even Nationally as an outstanding learning opportunity for students.

On August 21 and 22, a group of 10 students, accompanied by Mr. Kerr and helped by Keith Burdett, Jr., traveled to Leadville, Colorado to finalize the closing of last year's Tiny House. Mr. Jeremy Ricci made an offer on the home along with a request for the construction of another house, and the class jumped on the opportunity. It is important to understand how all of this came to be, because without a little risk and outside the box thinking, this sale would have never happened.

Throughout this process, social media, news media, and well connect friends of USD 303 have made this process very public. As news of what our students where doing spread, more and more

individuals and groups reached out to get more information. These questions lead to speaking engagements for the students and Mr. Kerr.

It was at one of these speaking engagements in early August where Mr. Kerr met Mr. Ricci. This chance encounter led to the purchase of the Tiny House built last year, and the plans for this year's home.

Mr. Ricci is a developer that has properties across the United States. He recently purchased a RV park in Leadville, CO, and is putting Tiny Homes in that can be rented similar to AirBNB or a motel room. This concept is what prompted him to ask for our construction class to build a Tiny Home in a similar style to the colorful, decorative homes of Leadville. The trip to Leadville allowed the students the opportunity to learn about the unique architecture and history of the community, and they came back with many ideas that they will use to design and ultimate construct this year's Tiny House.

Additionally, the program has been able to use the profits from the sale of the Tiny Houses to further develop opportunities for all students. This last year, the school started a SkillsUSA chapter. SkillsUSA is a partnership of students, teachers and industry working together to ensure America has a skilled workforce. SkillsUSA helps each student excel. We provide educational programs, events and competitions that support career and technical education (CTE) in the nation's classrooms. Our SkillsUSA chapter will also be able to provide scholarships to students exploring post secondary certifications.

The profits are also allowing us to improve the tools and machines our students have available to them. These improvements will allow our students the opportunity to expand what they are able to do, ultimately resulting in a student better prepared for the workforce. The most exciting purchase made with these profits is a CNC Router. This router will allow students to design any item they need for their projects on a computer, and then the router will cut the design out of plywood, wood, and plastics, and will allow for items to be engraved. This will greatly open the realm of possibilities for our students, school, and community. Many items that we would have to rely on entities outside of our community could now be designed and manufactured here.

The story doesn't stop there! As more and more schools witness the impact of this program on our students, their desire to step out of their own comfort zone and try something a little risky grows. More and more schools across the State and Nation are reaching out to Mr. Kerr and asking for advice as they venture into the construction of their own Tiny Houses. We wish Sterling High School, KS, Fredonia High School, KS, and Bertha Hewitt School District, Minnesota good luck as they travel down this road! We also wish good luck to all the schools that have began the conversations to start programs similar to ours.

News and notes from the desk of Tom Flax:

Fall is here as the calendar rolled over to the month of October! It's been a very busy, productive start to the 18-19 school year. Our annual "count day" was September 20th meaning, we have 147 students enrolled this year in the Jr/Sr High School with some very unique trends. We have 117 high school students meaning this is largest number that I have

ever reported to the state in my 12 years of being in Ness. On the contrast to that, we only have 30 students total enrolled in the junior high being the smallest that I have reported to the state in my tenure here. These significant disparity of sizes of classes has helped contribute to some different teaching assignments for this school year.

We do have a couple of new teachers to our building this year. Mr. Mark Hager has moved back to Ness City to take over our VoAg program. Mark has taught for several years in both Oklahoma and Kansas. This will be in February during the school day, so please be looking for this information later as we get closer to that time of the year.
