HOW TO PROMOTE YOUR CHILD'S SCIENCE, ENGINEERING AND MATH SKILLS By Kim McNinch

STEAM or STEM activities are being promoted and encouraged across the State of Kansas. This is due to the fact that the State of Kansas has a deficit of trained workers in the areas of technology, engineering, mathematics and sciences. With these deficits among workers many companies are relocating or recruiting out of state workers. Many people are intimidated by these fields of study. However, as parents there are many things you can do cheaply and inexpensively at home to develop the skills your child will need to find a productive and profitable job in the future. Many of these things are free or have minimal cost. They are found in dollar stores near vou. These include things like car launchers, airplane models, 3D puzzles, whirling helicopters, anything you can launch, anything solar powered, expandable foam creatures, etc. Whenever children engage in play that they can see and feel they are developing skills they can apply to STEM concepts. I watched a documentary on the comparison of Aboriginal

children and educated white children of Australia. The Aboriginal children far exceeded the educated white children in spatial relationships. Spatial relationships are essential in developing mathematical skills. These Aboriginal children who were uneducated possessed these skills while the educated white children lagged behind. The reason for this was because the Aboriginal children were constantly outside playing in nature. They were experiencing science phenomena all around them. They watched projectile motions from the weapons they used. They saw insects and birds in flight. They played with rocks and sticks and learned to build with them. They developed crucial skills simply by playing.

Video games, social media and TV will never exceed the developmental skills needed by future generations as well as activities which engage children with real life good ole fashion playing! Kids need to climb trees, go fishing, catch insects, build a fort, go hiking, shoot baskets and play with fire (adult supervision of course). All these activities are promoting skills Skills your child will need to have before they can truly excel in STEM. Encourage your child to play. The best tool for your child's education is right outside your door.

Another was when a student who had just taken an AR quiz told me, "Mrs. Marcus, that was the first time that I read the whole book!" How rewarding!!!!

I would be remiss not to mention the great help I have had by my paras and fellow teachers over the years. When establishing the Elementary School Library, Janice Fisher helped with typing and filing all the cards for the card catalog which is now obsolete. I also had Jeannie Reinert for a few years followed by Jean Schlegel who then became the City Library Director, and finally, Jo Pfannenstiel who continues to follow in my footsteps.

In the High School Library, Angela Muhurri, Michele Winter and Tammy Langer have all served as library paras and helped with getting the library automated and kept up to date. I truly appreciate all of the excellent help that I have received from these ladies.

In closing, I would like to thank all those who have been my friends and mentors through this journey in life. We can never take all the credit for our accomplishments because there is always someone behind us "who is the wind beneath our wings."

It has been a great privilege to have great educators such as Mrs. Marcus, Mrs. Schaub, and Mrs. Kepple in our school district. Thank you all for the many things you have done for our students, staff, school, and community. We wish you all well in retirement!





NCHS to Offer New Science Elective

Starting in the 2018-19 school year, juniors and seniors at NCHS will have the option to take a new science elective titled Environmental Science taught by Matthew Clay. The class will consist of field work where students will explore topics related to soil and water quality, environmental technologies, and ecological aspects of earth systems. During the class, students will learn skills that will be useful in environmental science and agriculture related careers, as well as to gain field experience that will be useful for students pursuing a variety of post-secondary options. The class was recently awarded a 2018 Grant for Excellence from the Wolf Creek Nuclear Operating Corporation which will allow for purchasing equipment that will enable the students to establish a GIS-based soil quality monitoring program. Local landowners who are interested and willing to have students collect small soil samples for testing and monitoring please email Mr. Clay at matt.clay@usd303.org or call the school. Several incoming Juniors and Seniors will also participate in this summer's Field Geology course which will again travel to Estes Park and Rocky Mountain National Park. The students will spend four nights tent camping in the Estes Valley. The plan is for the class to hike to the glacial Mills Lake as well as follow the 2017 class in climbing the 12,324' Flattop Mountain. Prior to the trip at the end of July, the students will complete 8 weeks of online coursework taught by Mr. Clay. Ms. Bernbeck will be attending this year as an additional sponsor. Overall, there are many exciting opportunities in the future of USD #303 to get students outside and exploring.
